is called for in order to bring today's perspectives into reality with the history that has molded our past. So, bear with me as I editorialize.

As a kid, May 30th was always an important day to me since WWII had just

ended and there was an extreme amount of patriotism throughout York County, PA. My uncles, who had been on active duty in the military during the war, were safely at home, peacetime activities were resuming, and we were living the "good old days" by today's standards. On this day, we always took time to remember those who had lost their lives defending the freedoms we cherish. There were parades, graves of veterans were decorated with American flags (thus Decoration Day), speeches were given by the politicians and the first picnic of summer was held. Since I played in the now defunct Glen Rock Band, I had to march in two parades on May 30, listen to two speeches,

and I was usually drenched in perspiration by the end of the second parade. But, more importantly, it was a day off from school since the holiday was always celebrated on May 30. It was a day when the country literally stopped to remember the sacrifices our armed services had provided for us so that we could enjoy our freedom. It was a day when we all bought replica poppies to remember those who offered the supreme sacrifice on Flanders Field and we proudly wore those poppies. All businesses were closed and you couldn't buy gas for \$.25 a gallon and, God forbid, you ran out of milk since the milkman didn't work that day either. That was the late 40's and 50's.



ICD Helps Refugees in Tanzania

In the last months of 2006, the ICD-USA Section became aware of a desperate need for dental equipment by Tanzanians serving groups of Burundian and Congolese refugees living in two camps in northwestern Tanzania. Earlier that year, a small team from the ADA, CDC and Health Volunteers Overseas (HVO) visited Tanzania to assess the need for a dental volunteer program. They found that the need for assistance was great.

The guidelines of the United Nations High Commission for Refugees do not include dental care. However, as refugees are not allowed to leave the camps except for emergencies, and since some refugees have resided in the camps for up to ten years, the lack of adequate dental care is now viewed as critical by the Tanzanian Red Cross Society.

The Burundian camp has a population of over 81,000. There are over 59,000 in the Congolese camp. A medical assistant and two nurses had been providing extractions on a limited schedule. Those in need of more involved dental care due to pain, infection, trauma or tumors are either transported to the dental school in Dar es Salaam, which is on the other side of the country, or to one of two local hospitals in the towns of Kasulu, or Kabanga which is located an hour south of the camps.

The ICD-USA Section was able to participate in this effort through a donation of \$22,000 from its Humanitarian Outreach Program. The money was used to replace two manual dental chairs at Kabanga Catholic Hospital. This allowed old equipment to be transferred, one each to the Mtabila II camp and the other to the Nyaragusu camp.
